



BRING US YOUR TP!

We are hosting a TP wrapping party in the Youth Group room! Please bring in TP from now through April 10. All donations will be given to the pantry.

Some updated facts supplied by the North Liberty Community Pantry include:

- 1. The Pantry spent \$8,638.55 on toilet paper in 2023, purchasing 14,850 rolls to distribute.
- 2. Setting a goal of \$10,000 would allow us to purchase at least 15,000 rolls again this year. Every roll donation impacts a household!
- 3. Toilet Paper is one of few items at the Pantry where we have a current limit due to cost restraints. Each household is allowed 2 rolls per weekly visit. Removing limits would be more equitable for households of various sizes.
- 4. Toilet paper is a necessity that can be cost prohibitive for those we serve. Paper products such as toilet paper are not covered by SNAP benefits.

AN INVITATION TO WALK AND TALK FOR MENTAL HEALTH

As you might imagine, more of our friends, neighbors, and family members are facing mental



health challenges and illness during the past few years. Fortunately, NAMI (the National Alliance on Mental Illness) is a wonderful local resource. They offer support groups and classes for both individuals and families. NAMIWalks, their annual fundraiser, helps to make it possible to provide these programs at no cost to community members.

Holy Trinity has formed a team, the "Holy Trinity Walkers and Talkers," as a way to support NAMI. Our walk will happen in North Liberty on **April 27**. A week later, the community-wide walk will occur in Iowa City at the Trueblood Recreation Area.

We invite you to join our team on April 27 and participate in our portion of the NAMIWalk. It will be will be a 3-mile loop from church, followed by an opportunity to interact socially on the patio. Our walk begins at 9:00 a.m. and lasts about an hour. Those who wish to talk without walking can drop by the church any time after 9:00 am. (If you are unable to join us on **April 27**, please feel free to participate in the Iowa City walk on May 4. Or consider participating both days.)

DID YOU KNOW THAT ...

... The most recent version of the USDA's Plant Hardiness Zone Map reflects warmer conditions across a wide swath of the United States. The brightly colored map found on the back of most seed packets provides guidance for selecting plants that are most likely to do well in a gardener's distinct climatic zone. The 2023 map is about 2.5 degrees Fahrenheit warmer than the 2012 map, and roughly half of the grid cells shifted a half zone warmer (*Civil Eats*, January 29).
