
#### Anniversary Postponement

## **DID YOU KNOW THAT**

... Prior to his recent death, two bottles of Kentucky bourbon signed by Pope Francis have raised tens of thousands of dollars for charity. Kentucky-based priest and papal missionary Jim Sichko asked him to autograph two bottles donated by the Willett Distillery, which sold for about \$30,000 at auction. The funds are going to a legal clinic that assists immigrants in Lexington and a Texas hospice organization. When Sichko presented Pope Francis with the two bottles and a pen, the Holy Father signed and then asked which of the bottles was for him. (AP, February 15)

....90% are Greenlanders are Inuit? They are also mostly Lutheran. A Danish missionary, Hans Egede, brought the church to the world's largest island more than 300 years ago. Until 1953, no other denominations were allowed to register and work there. Being Lutheran is still an important part of Greenlandic identity, even for many residents who no longer believe in God or attend church regularly. For others, Egede's legacy is divisive, representing the suppression of rich Inuit traditions and culture by Lutheran missionaries and Denmark's rule. The island remains a semi-autonomous territory of Denmark, but since Trump has expressed interest in acquiring it, the push for independence has received a boost, and both Lutheran folk customs and Indigenous traditions encourage national pride (RNS, March 7)

... Tech billionaire Bryan Johnson has been in the news frequently for trying not to die. You might recognize him as the guy who siphoned blood plasma from his minor son in order to fight the aging process. (When that didn't work, he removed all the plasma from his body and replaced it with albumin.) In a recent Netflix documentary, Johnson chronicles his daily regimen, which was written by an algorithm and includes taking 50 pills a day and eating nothing after noon. Still a fringe figure, he has become the poster child for the longevity movement — a group of scientists and entrepreneurs who hope the Trump administration will make it easier to develop treatments that prevent aging. Kara Bettis Carvalho points out the irony of this movement coexisting with the "right to die" movement. "One movement encourages life at all costs, another death on demand," she writes, but "both have an underlying logic of control" that's older than Genesis 3 (Christianity Today, January 30)

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
